VCU Launches **Advanced Certificate in Youth Development Management**



At the request of community partners, VCU launched its **Advanced Certificate in Youth Development Management**, an innovative program designed to equip professionals with essential skills for excelling in youth development. Led by **Dr. Vaughn Whitney Garland**, this non-credit program spans three semesters and combines coursework with on-site field placements. It targets professionals from sectors such as education, healthcare, and community organizations, providing training in culturally responsive programming, leadership strategies, and youth empowerment.

With an annual cohort of around twenty individuals, the program aims to create a community of leaders dedicated to positively impacting the lives of young people in Richmond and across Virginia.

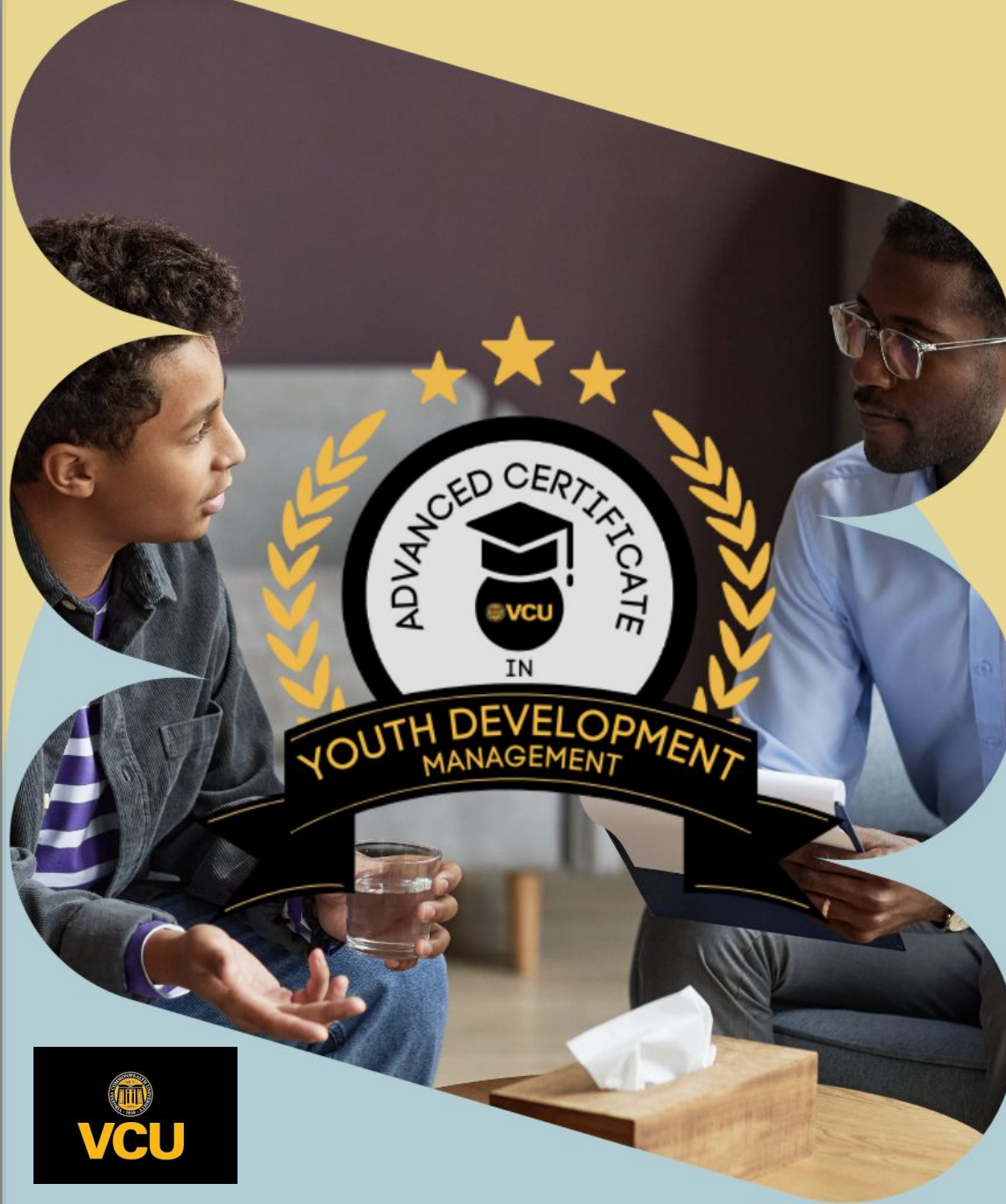
Advanced Certificate In Youth Development Management

A **non-credit credential** managed by the Mary and Frances Youth Center.

Eighty hours of coursework over three semesters.

The **VCU Advanced Certificate in Youth Development Management** offers essential training in workforce and positive youth development. Designed for professionals across various sectors, including early childhood education, outside-school-time (OST) youth and young adult programs and services, school and community group settings and healthcare facilities/offices.

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Carnegie Reclassification

Our Approach: Creating Engagement

- **Data Collection Efforts:** Focused on Carnegie reporting requirements
- **Stakeholder Conversations:** Engaging with internal and external stakeholders about findings
- **Gap and Opportunity Identification:** Pinpointing areas for improvement
- **Reclassification Process:** Leveraging it to enhance community engagement efforts

 - Review by Consultant being finalized
 - Goes to leadership for review in mid-February
 - Copy editor in March
- Submission Window - Week of March 24

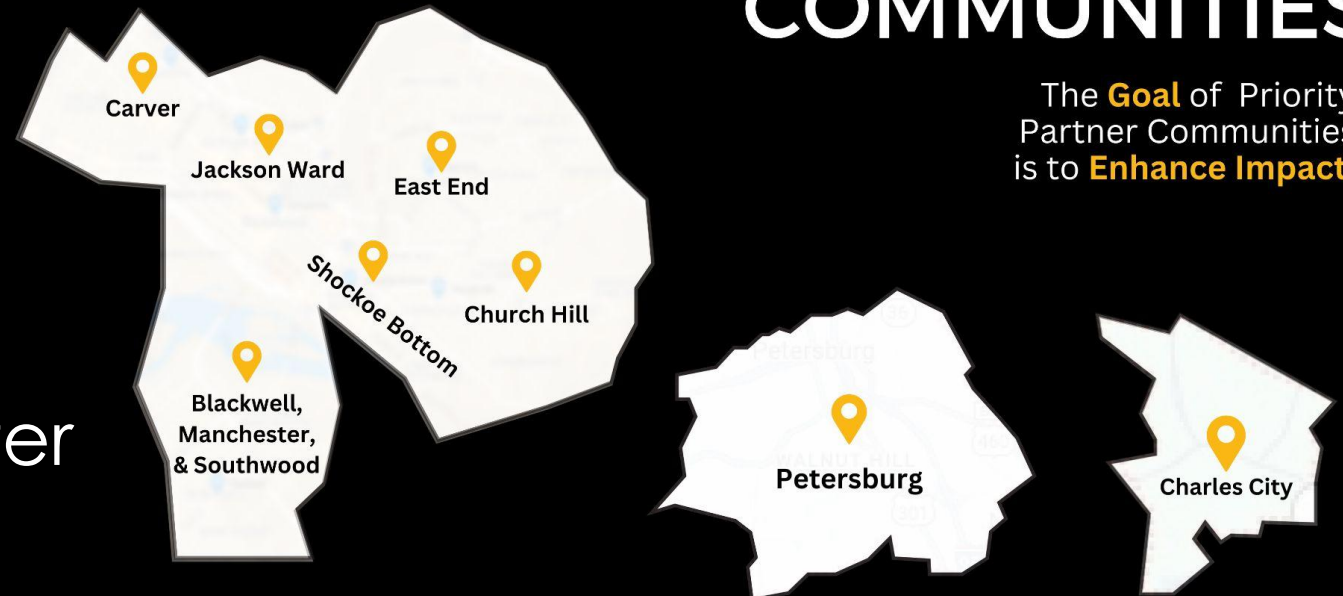
